10. A synopsis of the curriculum

This second year production/performance module is designed to further develop the student's understanding of the demands of the devising and rehearsal process, building on the experience of the first year module 'Introduction to Ensemble'. Students will be expected to demonstrate a higher level of responsibility and initiative, increasing their understanding of the role of the performer in the collaborative process. The module takes place towards the end of the summer term of the final year, providing the opportunity for students apply the skills they have acquired over the Foundation Degree in a production context and public performance.

Relevant skills and understanding are developed through students' participation in the production of an ensemble performance directed by a professional creator, emulating the experience of working as a member of a professional company. The module provides students with the skills necessary to progress into employment as a member of a company, or for further ensemble work should they continue onto the BA top-up programme. This project is delivered intensively over a number of weeks and normally includes extended daily rehearsals to facilitate a high level of creative and physical involvement. Preliminary workshops with the director/creator or a member of National Centre teaching staff will be organised to ensure students are prepared for the project.

13. Assessment methods.

Continuous assessment of a student's engagement with the devising and rehearsal process throughout the studio based workshops and rehearsals makes up 70 % of assessment for this module. This method of assessment will address learning outcomes 8.1, 8.2, 8.3, 8.4, 8.5, 9.1, 9.2, 9.3 and 9.4.

Assessment of each student during the final performance makes up 30% of the assessment for this module. This method of assessment will address learning outcomes 8.2, 8.4, 8.5 and 8.6.

Minimum attendance requirement for this module is 100% - all absences must be approved through concessions procedures. A first absence without concessionary approval will lead to a formal

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warning, and a second absence will lead to the student being withdrawn from the production and failing the module. An alternative project will be offered for retrieval.

Students must pass the continuous assessment element of this module in order to have met all learning outcomes.
